

Identifying Solutions to School-Based Prevention Programming Resistance

Objective: To disseminate key insights, resources, and ideas discussed during the Prevent Connect town hall focused on addressing resistance to school-based prevention programming. Additionally, to invite further discussion and collaboration including sharing standout resources, additional tips, and relevant tools applicable to both school-based and nightlife prevention efforts.

Standout Resources and Discussion Points:

- Expanding Beyond Schools:
 - Encouragement to engage young people in out-of-school spaces such as social media, afterschool programs, parks, libraries, summer camps, churches, nonprofits, and youth leadership groups.
 - Suggestions to use funds to involve young people/community in advisory groups, internships, peer education, or health promoter programs.
- Frame Community Safety:
 - Guidance on communicating about community safety and violence prevention using positive, practical, and plain language.
 - Highlight of polling data showing strong support for sex education, consent education, healthy relationships, and sexual orientation education. For example, a majority of parents and the public overwhelmingly support sex education (93%) and education on consent (96%), healthy relationships (96%), and sexual orientation (79%). Note: see the links for more details -- these percentages are for high school and from 2018 (as always, we want to be mindful of the data we reference).
- Be a Myth Buster:
 - Several of the speakers discussed the pervasiveness of myths about LGBTQ+ people and communities. Share the facts. Research consistently shows LGBTQ+ people are no more likely to enact sexual violence than heterosexual or cisgender people.
